Festival Day 2024

Marian College was the venue for our annual Festival Day in 2024 with over 80 Vincentians being present. The event – MC'd by our Young Vinnies Coordinator, Cyrene Tionko, has been described by many as inspiring given the excellent presentations during the day and the top-class facilities at the college's amazing new building.

Proceedings commenced with Mass being celebrated by Fr Chris Orr in the beautiful chapel of the college with music by Liz Mulholland who ensured our singing was of the highest order. After morning tea, Fr Chris provided those present with a very thoughtful spiritual reflection that had three themes: "Seeing the face of Christ in the poor; Be evangelised by the poor and Evangelise the poor." He concluded with comment: Be grateful for what God does for us."





Elizabeth Owens (President, Nelson Area Council) spoke on how we might make our meetings more interesting through leadership, team building, making our prayers more uplifting, changing meeting venues, guest speakers and sharing the mahi! Certainly, much food for thought by our Conferences.

Mike Daly facilitated an important session on 'Membership.' Maurice Lawlor was first up and spoke via a video, on the steps that Conferences must take if they wish to hold a successful recruitment plan. This was then followed by very thoughtful presentations by Jenny Carter (Rangiora President) and Ian Tennant (former Selwyn President).

After an enjoyable luncheon, our National President (Gerry Stevens) emphasised how important were our Conference members and thanked them for their work for the Society in Canterbury. He also emphasised the importance of our spirituality when delivering food parcels – see the face of Jesus in the poor!





Guest speaker from Catholic Social Services (Luis Arevalo) spoke about the importance of Advocacy for those in need and the importance of counselling for the depressed - including anger management and grief. This was followed by a thought-provoking session provided by Bruce Mayhew who asked the question "why am I a Vincentian?" A series of short video clips followed from Vincentians around the world that provided some inspirational responses.



Myola Mendonca and Robyn Casey then responded to some of the most frequently asked questions on Welfare matters by Conference members.

Cyrene Tionko outlined his work as the Young Vinnies / Young Adult Co-ordinator and outlined his achievements over the past year and his action plan for the coming year.

The day was rounded off with Area President (Mike Moore) summarising the achievements of the past year and his goals for the next three years. He also thanked our guests for their attendance including Gerry Stevens, Luis Arevalo, Elizabeth Owens, Anne-Marie McCartan (NEO), Julie Hands (West Coast) and Keith Norton (Oceania Rep).



Finally, a big "thank you" to Bruce Mayhew and all the amazing team from the Cathedral Conference that hosted the occasion. The event took a lot of organisation and considerable effort on the day - so from all attendees, our grateful appreciation to all who volunteered that made for an outstanding day!

A Journey to a Free Society - by lan Tennant

Our Selwyn Conference of St Vincent de Paul in Canterbury began operating in 2021. In mid-2022 we were asked to become sponsors of a Community Refugee Sponsorship programme (CORS) and sponsor an Afghan refugee, at that time located in Pakistan. By November '22 we were registered CORS sponsors and able to nominate a refugee we would support. We owe a large debt to St Joseph's Conference in New Plymouth for their invaluable help in getting registered.

We began communications with the man who was seeking a new life for himself and then, later, his family. He was seeking a life in New Zealand, free from Taliban threats to his existence, and for the chance for his children, especially his two daughters, to grow up in a free society, where they could be educated and be free to choose their futures. This was something now denied them after the Taliban took power in their home country. The immigration process took a long time, but, in the meantime, a change in government policy meant his family could accompany him. This increased our commitment dramatically from looking after the resettlement of one individual to that of a family of eight.



The family finally arrived on 30th June 2024 at the start of a miserable winter week in Christchurch. Emergency funds were handed over, cell phones provided, and suitable clothing bought. These were followed by supervised self-drive excursions to ensure familiarity with NZ road rules. By the end of the first week temporary accommodation was located, with a lot of associated drama and 3 days of hard work by a wonderful Vinnies team, to make the accommodation liveable.

The resettlement process began the day after they arrived, and within the week the parents had bank accounts, IRD numbers, and full MSD benefits. Orientation began with a trip into the city centre to the Botanical Gardens, followed a couple of days later with a trip to the seaside at Sumner, which was the first time they had seen the sea. A very emotional and heartwarming event for me. A few weeks later we were able to obtain more permanent rental accommodation and in the meantime, the children had all been enrolled in school, medical and dental centres, as well as having been given Metro passes and a couple of familiarisation trips to a local mall.

A couple of months on from this, the family are happy, settled and establishing links with their local community. The children are thriving at the local schools, and we can now take pause to reflect on the journey so far.

There have been many wonderful things that have come from this: the knowledge we have contributed greatly to improving the quality of life for this family; the bond of friendship that has strengthened our membership as we worked towards the common goal of making this family welcome; the humbling level of generosity from both our parishioners and the wider Christian community, especially the Hope Church in Rolleston; the realisation that we have so much to be grateful for in New Zealand and how great the need is for our assistance to the rest of the world. Lastly, for me personally, the realisation I have done something really worthwhile and life altering, not only for this family we have supported, but also for myself.

I look forward to the remains of our two-year commitment in this resettlement process with confidence and with gratitude for having been given this opportunity to make a small difference in the world.

The Ozanam Apartments, Pavitt St

- what's happening with the young mothers

Kath Prins (St John of God (Waipuna) interviewed one of our young mum's following her experience at Ozanam Apartments. Here is her story (name changed).

Ella came to the Ozanam Apartments from emergency housing. Ella said she "felt really excited for me and my daughter because it was a really nice house." Having a warm, dry, healthy home gave Ella space and time to develop supportive relationships, connect with agencies, and focus on her baby.

During Ella's time at the Ozanam Apartments she "made heaps of friends there. The other mums were all friendly and really supportive." The support that Ella appreciated most was "the support workers, they were very helpful, always there when you needed something. They were always there to help you." Ella found that Waipuna staff assigned to the Ozanam Apartments supported "a lot with baby. Stuff for baby and advice for baby."

Waipuna also helped in many other areas, "whatever you needed help with in your life, they just got it sorted." Ella and her daughter have moved on from Ozanam Apartments, though they remain actively involved with Waipuna. Ella still finds this input invaluable. "Waipuna were the only ones that helped me move. I was sick at the time and it was hard. They have helped me to learn to pay bills, like my power bill and rent and have helped when MSD got things wrong." Ella has learned to put trust in professionals and to ask for help when she needs it. "My support worker taught me it was okay to ask for help. It's not like other support places. Waipuna go over and above and help with whatever is needed."


Ella continues to connect with different services within Waipuna as she works towards her goals and dreams.
